- Scale implications of first federal \$






Understanding DOTs and Engineers



Many Rural Areas Are Covered by Regional Planning Organizations





A Few Specific Points

- 1. Read and *understand* the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO)
- 2. Understand the value of the project to your community and sell that to the funding agency
 - Economically
 - Health
 - Recreation
- 3. Match your project to the NOFO and make sure the projects you select truly address the grant criteria, and doesn't just pay lip service
 - Equity
 - Multi modal
 - Environmental
 - Sustainability

Note: Don't think adding a three-foot bike lane to a four lane Road will convince USDOT that you are serious about getting folks off your roads!
